On Friday, December 6th, seventeen of us packed meals at Feed My Starving Children in Aurora. Along with other groups there that evening, we packed 90 boxes (19,440 meals) enough to feed 53 children a daily meal for a year!



On Sunday, December 15th, nine of us volunteered at the Kids Above All Better Life distribution center in Des Plaines. We wrapped our donation of gifts for 7 teens living in the Downers Grove and Lisle group homes. Together with Faith UMC, Lombard, we provided over \$600 in gifts to these teens. Green Team Ministries

We have a PLASTIC problem, but you can help alleviate some of it and keep yourself healthier. Take a glass or bottle with you so you don't use a plastic cup at restaurants. Don't buy bottled water—it contains more microplastics than tap water. Don't buy food that is packaged in PLASTIC (yes, this is difficult but work on it) and store your food in the refrigerator in glassware. Don't microwave in PLASTIC containers—it's not a good idea! Wash the PLASTIC containers you have by hand, not in the dishwasher where microplastics can leach into the water.

Unfortunately, no matter how diligent you are, microplastics and nano plastics are impossible to avoid because they are in the air we breathe, in the food we eat, and in our drinking water. By making the small changes listed above, you can work to reduce your own plastic usage.

Christian Nationalism workshop

Community Rummage Sale

This year's Community Rummage Sale, held on October 5, 2024, was another great success! Thanks to more than 70 volunteers (approximately 50 youth and 20 adults) representing Boy Scout Troop 45, the Glenbard West Choir, the Glenbard West Theatre, and FUMC, so much good was done for the community.

The vision for the rummage sale is simple – to give youth in our community an opportunity to experience the joy of serving while also providing for team building, parent involvement, and fundraising for local organizations. The sale is a community event where everyone is working with each other and for each other.

The sale brought in a profit of \$4,000, which was split among the four organizations who volunteered. In addition to those groups, several other charities were represented at the sale. The Glen House Food Pantry had a table set up to create awareness and collect donations, and they received a donation from the Glenbard West Theatre. Feed My Starving Children received a donation of both volunteer time and money from the Glenbard West Choir. The Epilepsy Foundation received donations, as well, in the form of items to resell or donate.
